The Gall of Ash Trees

While Caitlin Clark may be draining threes in front of court logos, all you need to do is drain your street in front of your home. Those brown or green clusters hanging from branches of ash trees are known as ash flower galls. The galls do not harm the tree. What do they harm? The drains.

The drains become compromised after heavy rain and wind storms. Galls, leaves, branches

and other debris clog the storm drains and cause roadway flooding. Trash that flows into the storm drains pollutes our waterways. Please be vigilant regarding the street storm drains near your house. Safely keep the curbs and drains free of debris throughout the year. Please be aware of surroundings, namely



traffic when attempting to clear the debris.

Protect life and property on land as well as in our waterways. Contact the Department of Public Works (DPW) whenever the drain issues are beyond routine maintenance. Examples are: inability to clean the drain; items hazardous to you and others; illegal dumping; and other issues that require special handling. When in doubt, call the DPW at 630-420-6095 to report a malfunctioning drain.

Hanging in Low Places? Branch Out

Parkway trees are the responsibility of the homeowner. Please trim low-lying branches. Naperville handles the trimming of parkway trees on a seven-year cycle.

The tree trimming program is intended to promote healthy, safe and attractive growth of these trees, which includes any planted in the parkway by the city or private homeowners.

Trained city personnel follow the most up-to-date techniques for trimming, including non-flush cutting of limbs. Naperville trims to a level of 12 feet over the curb line to provide enough clearance for truck traffic. In more developed areas which contain mature trees, the city concentrates on removing dead tree limbs.

CCF PART OF NASCAR CHICAGO RACE FESTIVITIES

 Iow Creek Farm is the lucky recipient of a NASCAR Community Impact Award given to nonprofit organizations!
 The award is in conjunction with the Chicago Street Race

Weekend to be held on July 6-7. NASCAR is holding both Cup Series and Xfinity Series races on those days. The Xfinity Series practice and qualifying sessions and race, the Loop 110 (50 laps), will be held on Saturday. The Cup Series practice and qualifying sessions will be held Saturday, with the race, the Grant Park 165 (75 laps), scheduled for Sunday.

Julie Giese, Chicago Street Race President, said NASCAR officials and personnel will help CCF host a mini street race festival prior the Chicago Street Race Weekend. The CCF event is chock-full of activities. The activities will begin with a small parade of kids on bikes and a ribbon cutting ceremony on the evening of Friday, June 28. Dario Franchitti, retired Scottish driver and 3-time Indy 500 winner, will cut the ribbon and serve as grand marshal. The Motorsports Hall of Fame of America driver Franchitti was happy to participate because he is a relative of the Clow family, who immigrated from Scotland. A Carolina-style barbeque and entertainment at the Tot Lot will follow. Local band, Dirty Ernie, which includes CCF residents Drew and Kevin Shaffer, will reunite and headline.

Resident racing practice sessions will be held on Saturday. The classic rock station DRV, known as The Drive, will be broadcasting live from the Tot Lot in the afternoon from 2-5 pm. The Canadian rock band Crash Test Dummies will perform from 7-8:30 pm. Qualifying sessions will be held on Sunday afternoon. The race will be held on June 31. CCF resident, David Scriven-Young, will sing the National Anthem. Shane van Gisbergen, 2023 Grant Park 220 Champion, will ride in the pace van, according to April S. Loofen, spokesperson for the Dutch driver.


Racing will consist of multiple courses and vehicle categories – van, SUV, auto, and EV. EV is a separate category because it has an acceleration advantage over internal combustion motors and its quieter when operating. Trucks will not be participating. The sprints will be held on Schillinger. An oval course will be set up to run on Dairymans and Wicklow. A longer, more complicated track will include the entire neighborhood and utilize all the cul-de-sacs.

The mini street races will incorporate concepts not seen in the auto racing world. No fencing or tires will be put up in the corners. NASCAR wanted street conditions to be as realistic as possible. Drivers are penalized for driving 25 mph or lower. They will also be penalized when coming to a complete stop exiting the cul-de-sacs. Drivers will be responsible for any damage to homeowner property though.

Cars will exceed 100 mph on the straightaways in the Chicago Street Race, only slightly higher than the speeds in Clow Creek on Schillinger and Wicklow. We recommend keeping kids and pets in the house until the racing is over. Residents are discouraged from walking, running, bicycling and doing yard work during the racing events.

All the race festival events are free to CCF residents because of generous sponsorships. There is no entry fee for those choosing to race. The Dairy Association of Illinois will sponsor drivers. Another major sponsor is online shopping group Guilt. CCF will get a commission of the items sold during the event. Additional sponsors include DoorDash, StoreSprint, Kaffeine Koffee, Krash Champions and Kars2Kids.

The racing festival will conclude with a divine performance by cover band No Kids on the Block.



City News You Can Use

Yard Waste Collection

Place grass, weeds, small branches, twigs and leaves in 32-gallon paper yard waste bags or yard waste carts. Branches less than 3" in diameter may be tied in bundles up to four feet long and two feet wide. Secure each bundle with biodegradable twine.

A yard waste sticker is required on each bag or bundle placed at the curb for collection on garbage day. Yard waste stickers are \$2.75 each and may be purchased at Naperville hardware and grocery stores or from the Finance Department in the Naperville Municipal Center, 400 S. Eagle St. To view a list of local retailers that sell yard waste stickers, visit naperville.il.us/yardwaste. Stickers that were \$2.50 in 2023 can be used through April 30, 2029.

Residents with greater yard waste needs and/or an interest in recycling organics such as food scraps can choose between two yard waste cart sizes. In lieu of purchasing paper yard waste bags and stickers, residents may rent a 65-gallon cart that holds approximately 3 bags a week, or a 95-gallon cart that holds approximately 4 bags a week. The 2024 fee to rent a 65-gallon cart is \$194.25 and a 95-gallon cart is \$236.25.

Residents choosing to utilize this convenient service can place all their yard waste in the provided cart as well as certain types of food waste. Please note: food waste composting will only be available to residents who subscribe to the yard waste cart option to avoid animal pilferage.

Arbor Day Tree Sale

The City of Naperville's sale link closes on April 17 at 5 pm, or until all tress are sold, whichever comes first. Residents are limited to six trees. Residents will schedule their pickup time online after the order is complete. A drive-thru tree pickup will take place on Saturday, April 20 at the Public Works Service Center, 180 Fort Hill Dr., from 8 am to 1 pm. For safety reasons, residents are asked to stay in their vehicles. City staff members will load the tree(s). For more info, visit

Rain Barrels Available

Naperville, in partnership with the Conservation Foundation and Upcycle Products, offers rain barrels for purchase. Your order must be received in mail-in form by April 12 or online before April 15 in order to be picked up during the tree sale drive-thru on Saturday, April 20 at the Public Works Service Center from 8 am to 1 pm. A portion of rain barrel sales will be donated to the Conservation Foundation. \$50 Electric Lawn Rebate

Naperville residents can apply for a \$50 rebate by purchasing electric lawn equipment in 2024. To qualify for the rebate, residents must purchase a battery-powered electric lawn mower, trimmer, edger or snow blower on or after Jan. 1. 2024. Also included are manually-powered reel lawn mowers. A copy of the purchase receipt is required. The City will accept applications until May 31, 2024, or until all funds are allocated. You are eligible for one rebate per household pe calendar year. Naperville Memorial Day Observances and Parade

Judd Kendall VFW Post 3873, American Legion Post 43, and the Naperville Municipal Band will conduct Memorial Day observance activities on Monday, May 27. The parade is scheduled to begin at 10:30 am. The main parade starts off from Jackson Avenue and West Street. It heads east to Main Street, then north to Benton Avenue. It turns east to the Saints Peter & Paul parking lot. A Memorial Day Observance Ceremony will be held at Central Park following the parade, beginning at approximately 12:00 pm.

Prior the parade, the day's events will begin with a memorial service behind City Hall at the Commander Dan Shanower Memorial. Additional memorial services will be held at various military memorials around Naperville including Veterans Park, Ss Peter and Paul Cemetery, Burlington Square and Naperville Cemetery. Members of the community are invited to join the memorial services.

CCF HOA Board Meeting Summary March 12, 2024 - 95th Street Library

Attendees - Board members present were Heidi Weiland, Matt Schuman, Andy Hollinger and Brian Marsalli. Umar Ahmad was absent because of travel. No residents attended.

Secretary Report – The January 8 board meeting minutes were approved unanimously. Most of the annual dues have been received. A second notice was placed in mailboxes of homeowners who not submitted payment yet. We have no new homeowners to report since annual meeting.


Treasury Report – Reported income of \$56,121.89 was received from annual dues. The budget is \$59,500 and we expect to meet that amount when all the dues have been received and processed. Expenses of \$3,473.71 have been

paid so far this year for utilities, insurance, office supplies and website maintenance. Current cash balance is \$152,274.39. Based on budgeted income and expenses we are budgeted to end the year with a cash balance of \$4,626.21

Outdoor Beautification Report – The Tot Lot and Entrance improvements that are contracted for completion in 2024 are on schedule. Andy Hollinger is taking over as chairperson of this committee.

Social Events/Communications Report – The Easter Egg Hunt is taking place on March 16. Flyers were placed in homeowner mailboxes. The next newsletter comes out in April.

New Business – No new business was presented. No homeowners attended.



Annual Dues – Thank you to all the residents who have paid the annual assessment dues. Please submit your payment immediately to avoid late fees. Annual Budget – The 2024 budget is in the December newsletter or by request.



Attention Vacation Goers. Have someone put recycling receptacles back into the garage. Being gone for an extended period does not relieve you of your duty to follow our rules and regulations. Moreover, making sure your trash and recycling cans are inside your garage protects your property. Storing them outside provides a highly visible clue to burglars that no one is home.

People are already reaching out to the board for upcoming projects. Thank you to those who have reached out before beginning an outdoor project. Those who submitted project information received replies within 24-48 hours. As a reminder, major outdoor projects completed in 2023 without board approval may be subject to modification later and/or fines due to noncompliance. If you had work done, please notify the board to get your project properly recorded. Whenever in doubt whether a project requires board approval, please reach out to the Board. The Board provides an approval directly to you. The contractor never receives direct approval from us. The Codes and Covenants were put in place to protect the value of our properties. Both the Codes and Covenants and Rules and Regulations are available on our website at clowcreekfarm.com under the "Association Documentation" section.

PROPERTY MAINTENANCE CREATES VALUE & SAVES MONEY

Did you know that maintaining your property in good condition is codified in our Declaration of Covenants, Restrictions, Easements, Charges, and Liens for Clow Creek Farm? Maintaining your property doesn't always involve a big ticket item. Replacing a mailbox, trimming overgrown branches, removing straggly or dead bushes, repairing torn screens and professionally painting the front door are small dollar outlays that bring noticeable results. Badly damaged siding, trim, gutters, fences and old roofs, as well as dead tree removal, are examples of larger ticket items that need prompt attention. Maintaining your property to the highest standards also helps your pocketbook by preventing both minor and major issues with structural damage.

The Clow Creek Farm *Legacy*

As residents of Clow Creek Farm we live on a storied property in Wheatland Township. The Robert Clow family immigrated from Scotland and settled in Naperville in 1844. Robert paid \$1.25 an acre for what now includes Clow Creek Farm. His great-greatgreat grandson William F. Clow sold the property to MAF Developers, Inc. The development of our community began in the mid '90's. During the growth of our neighborhood, William F.'s wife Betty Jean continued to live on the undeveloped property which



became Clow Creek Farm Addition. Betty Jean was a terrific neighbor for several years before moving. Betty Jean, who lived most of her adult life on the Clow-Land Dairy Farm, passed away in February of 2023 at 101. Clow Creek Farm was good for her as she was for it. Let us honor the legacy of Betty Jean and William F. and the rest of the Clow family by respecting the history of the land, upholding its beauty and creating our own family memories.
